This is no small goal, given that she has little support at home. Her parents are divorced and she lives with her single mom who is currently unemployed.

"If I work, who will take care of the children?" said her mother, Magdalene, who has three other children apart from Alicia, including an oldest son who is autistic and requires special care.

Alicia and her second brother, Nicholas, were among the 10 CapitaKids from HELP Family Service Centre whom select CapitaLand staff members have volunteered to mentor under a new 10-year support programme, CapitaKids Programme. Along with their parents and siblings, these children joined 112 others who are beneficiaries of the Green for Hope @ CapitaLand programme on a P.E.E.K. (Providing Educational Exposure for Kids) excursion to CapitaLand's latest family shopping, dining and entertainment destination, JCube. P.E.E.K. is a volunteer-led educational tour which gives school-going children an opportunity to witness and understand the eco-friendly efforts and facilities behind select CapitaLand properties.

"I wanted my child to mingle with the other children from different backgrounds so that they can learn to understand them and

better empathise with their situation," said Lee Aik Mei, Finance Executive at CapitaLand Commercial Limited, who not only volunteered to help at the event but also brought along her eight-year-old daughter, Chiew Yee Jie.

Building Strong Families

For the well over 100 children, though, the highlight of the morning was the chance to have a go at Singapore's first Olympic-size ice-skating rink at JCube. They were all a jitter with excitement as they put on the ice skates, many for the first time. Several were seen holding on to the CapitaLand volunteers for support as they teetered towards the giant rink. Being fearless, most kids were able to get the hang of things within minutes. "I just held onto the railings and tried out the movements I watched others doing," said 11-year-old Long Si Yong. "After a while, I could skate out to the middle of the rink."

The children were then brought around the mall and introduced to its environmentally-friendly features. Solar panels on the roof gather sunlight that is then converted into electricity.

Nine-year-old Chin Zech was particularly wowed by the solar panels. "I thought it was so interesting that the solar panels can absorb light to be converted into energy."

The stairways near the lift lobby are equipped with motion-sensor lights so that the lights are activated only when there is movement. This helps to save 1.4 million kWh of energy or enough power to power 292 four-room Housing Development Board (HDB) flats for a whole year. This particular feature was something the children loved best not only because the energy-savings were astounding, it was also a fun feature.

At The Rink, ice scraped off during the resurfacing of the rink is collected in an ice-melting pit along with condensate water from the dehumidifiers. The grey water is then used to pre-cool the water entering the cooling towvers and evaporative cooling system in the air-conditioning system of the mall. This cuts down about 8.8 tonnes of carbon emission a year.

"I like the motion lights feature best because it helps to save electricity and money said 11-year-old Nurul Shazwina.

The final pit stop was the toilets in B1 that have green-labelled toilet partitions made of 30 per cent recycled material which is low in emission and toxicity. More than half the toilet walls are also coated with titanium dioxide, a substance that can

remove mould, bacteria, viruses, and odour; and prevent discolouration and rust.

At the end of the tour, the children were treated to a Kentucky Fried Chicken lunch and given goodie bags with a CHF stationery set and a CapitaFrog plush toy each.

"I have always wanted to volunteer and CapitaLand has given me the opportunity to do so. I have three teenagers of my own so I want to be able to help other families with their children," said Belinda Gan, Financial Controller, CapitaLand Limited.

Manager, Design Development, CapitaValue Homes, Carl Wee who has a two-year-old son agreed, "I like volunteering to help children. They are so genuine and they enjoy the activities so much that it is such a joy and stress-reliever to watch them."

So, even as CapitaLand works to build families at the corporate level, the individual CapitaLand volunteers have found that they are similarly inspired to give to families beyond their own. And that, is what fostering strong families through the community is all about.
